



#### FY24 COPS Grant Programs

- Tribal Resources Grant Program (TRGP via the Coordinated Tribal Assistance Solicitation or CTAS)
  - Supports tribes in hiring officers and equipment/training needs
- COPS Hiring Program (CHP)
  - Covers 75% of officer salary and benefits, up to \$125,000 for three years
- Community Policing Development (CPD)
  - Promoting Access to Crisis Teams
  - Accreditation
  - Microgrants seed funds for innovative community policing projects, typically in specific focus areas described in the solicitation
  - Safer Outcomes (De-escalation)
- School Violence Prevention Program
  - Funds school safety equipment (locks, lighting, etc.), technology, and training for local law enforcement
- Law Enforcement Mental Health and Wellness
  - Funds training, peer mentoring, and mental health program activities for law enforcement officers







# Available FLETC Training

- All FLETC training is available to state, local, Tribal, territorial and campus/university LEOs, to include Direct Support Personnel\* (FY24= over 11,000 trained)
- Training is offered at no-cost or low-cost to the law enforcement agencies, to include training equipment
- Training is delivered in-residence and as export training

The Human Trafficking Awareness Training (HTAT). This program provides an introduction to current indicators for human trafficking, an overview of federal statutes, and applicable state law related to trafficking. The training is oriented with case studies, videos, and student- centered learning activities tailored to your community's unique challenges.

Followed by a panel discussion with state, local, and federal subject matter experts.



# Department of Homeland Security Leadership Academy (DHSLA)


Retired law enforcement professionals and subject matter experts who:

# Case Assistance Deployments: How can we help?

- Facilitating biometric DNA collection by law enforcement (kits provided by NCMEC free of charge)
- Locating medical records, fingerprints, dental radiographs, and other biometric data for the missing child
- Assistance with the collection of a DNA sample to be uploaded into a genealogy site
- Assistance to determine identity in cases of unidentified remains, infant abductions, and unidentified-living cases
- Exhumations to collect comparison DNA
- Access to Forensic Odontologists and Forensic Anthropologists
- Analytical resources provided by NCMEC's Analytical Services Division

#### **CART** Initiative

There are 130+ Child Abduction Response Teams (CART) identified in the US. A Team Adam Consultant (TAC) is assigned as a liaison to each of these teams to:

- Provide presentations on NCMEC resources
- Access to executive trainings at NCMEC HQ
- Become an integral part of local teams, making resources immediately available
- Attend CART meetings/mock scenarios





# Tribal Access Program (TAP)

- NCMEC is reaching out to Native American communities and providing a TAC as a liaison to each nation through the Tribal Access Program (DOJ).
- TACs are available to assist in the event of a missing child episode on Tribal lands.
- There are over 570 Federally recognized tribes within the United States and several hundred more that are recognized by states.





# Disaster Response

NCMEC has partnered with FEMA to assist with reunification efforts for missing children during times of disaster.

- On-site assistance at Federally declared disasters
  - Natural or man-made
- FEMA contractor credentials
- State requests for assistance
- Recent deployments:
  - Hurricane Harvey (Texas)
  - Hurricane Maria (Puerto Rico)


# Rural LISC



For almost 30 years Rural LISC has worked with and through grassroots partners located in rural communities and regions.

We are a connector and cross-pollinator for our partners, linking them to national opportunities, to each other and aggregating resources they might not otherwise access without our network.

Working closely with partners helps us cover a large national footprint.

#### The Rural Landscape

20 percent of our country's population resides in rural places. That's 60 million people who live and work in rural communities.

From the standpoint of a competitive America, we must recognize and leverage the extraordinary talent and assets of the vast part of the nation that is rural.



When discussing impact, not scale, you have to set the stage for impact measurements using a different context. Add one talented special education teacher, one full-service grocer, and the gains may well spread, like ripples in a rain puddle, to the furthest reaches of the community. 

#### **Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, Justice**

Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Justice are the core values that encompass the cornerstone of who we are, what we do, how we measure impact, with whom we partner, how we earn trust, and show up in our community. Rural LISC values listening to and engaging neighborhood residents and community members, and incorporating their input and feedback into the design, creation, and execution of LISC's work.

We will strive to cultivate leadership, organizational capacity, and technical skills of residents, practitioners, and community-based organizations to help make life outcomes more equitable; and to support and expand the impact of BIPOC leadership, identify and counteract systemic racism, and foster partnerships to advance systems change and racial justice in rural America.



When Rural LISC works in a community, all available resources are deployed at all levels of a community's development plan.

Rural LISC resources are integrated and are proven to leverage funding and partnerships for continued community development.

A holistic and comprehensive approach is taken with every community.

Housing: Since 1995, Rural LISC has supported the development and preservation of 52,904 affordable homes across the Rural LISC network. LISC and its affiliates have invested more than \$2.75B in grants, loans, lines of credit, recoverable investments, and equity for the development of affordable housing.

Wealth Building: Rural LISC's Financial Opportunity Center network works to increase the financial well-being of individuals and families, with 60% of their clients increasing their net income and 68% increasing their net worth in 2022.

Local Government: LISC runs the U.S. HUD Distressed Cities Technical Assistance program, investing more than \$12M in small units of local government to increase their internal capacity and address barriers to community development.

Broadband and Infrastructure: Rural LISC works with community leaders, elected officials and stakeholders to map out a community's broadband and infrastructure needs, and how to maximize on historic public dollar investments coming into rural communities today. In the last year, \$80M has been leveraged for rural broadband projects.

Regional Employers: Rural LISC's workforce development programming strengthens a rural community's workforce ecosystem. Since 2021, Rural Works resulted in more than 3,500 job placements, leveraging more than \$12M in additional supports.

Commercial and Community

Property: 8.8M square feet of commercial and community facilities has been built through creative capital projects across the Rural LISC network.

Capacity Building: To date, Rural LISC has deployed more than \$2.75B to partner organizations, including \$99.9M in capacity building grants for local community-based partners.

Community Anchors: Rural LISC has trained 120 Digital Connectors with anchor institutions like rural libraries and community-based organizations. These hubs help residents get connected to low-cost Internet and devices, resulting in enhanced digital skills.

Small Business: Since 2020, Rural LISC has helped keep rural Main Street open for business by providing more than \$40M in grants, capital, and technical assistance to a variety of small businesses.
